Protect Your Flock Prevent Avian Influenza



High Pathogenic Avian Influenza

Cases of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) have been confirmed in Saskatchewan backyard flocks and commercial poultry flocks.

On April 14, 2022, Saskatchewan's Chief Veterinary Officer put in place an animal health control area order to limit the co-mingling of poultry due to the risk of HPAI. The order, in place until May 14, 2022, prohibits the movement to and participation of birds in shows, auctions and agricultural fairs, as well as any other events where birds would be brought together from multiple locations.

Producers are reminded that biosecurity remains the best tool for poultry producers and small Protocols include keeping wild birds away from poultry flocks and their food and water supply, limiting visitors and monitoring bird health. Small flock owners are encouraged to confine their birds indoors, if possible, during wild bird migration. Producers should contact their veterinarian immediately if they have concerns about the health status of their flocks. If avian influenza is suspected, producers should also contact their local Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) office. CFIA-confirmed findings of HPAI in domestic poultry are posted on the **CFIA website**.

Producers can also access information on the disease on the Government of Saskatchewan flock owners to protect their birds from avian influenza.

2022 Big Game Draw Opens Online May 1

Saskatchewan's Big Game Draw opens on May 1. Hunters have until May 25 to submit their online applications.

The Big Game Draw is used to allocate a limited number of hunting licences to Saskatchewan residents in a transparent and equitable manner. This year's draw includes licences for elk, moose, pronghorn, either-sex mule deer and antlerless mule deer.

The draw is administered through the Saskatchewan Hunting, Angling and Trapping Licence (HAL) system.



Draw results will be available through your HAL account in June, with the exception of pronghorn, which will be available in mid-July. Although Big Game Draw applicants are sent a notification of their draw results, hunters are responsible for looking up their results through their HAL account. Hunters can submit, review and update their applications, check pool status history and purchase a draw licence through their HAL accounts.

Hunters should review the 2022 Big Game Draw Supplement for information on quotas for draw species prior to submitting their draw application. The supplement also informs hunters of any changes to this fall's Big Game Draw seasons. The supplement can be found at <u>saskatchewan.ca/hunting</u>.

Applications for the Big Game Draw can be submitted until May 25 at 11:59 p.m. Hunters are encouraged to apply early and to use the online residency verification tool to avoid complications. Successful applicants will be able to purchase licences through their HAL accounts beginning August 1.

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Saskatchewan Extending Public Engagement on Virtual Care

The Government of Saskatchewan is seeking feedback from additional patients and health care providers on their experiences with virtual care by extending the survey two more weeks until May 15, 2022.

The Virtual Care Engagement has had more than 2,161 survey participants and over 754 poll participants. Currently, 84 per cent of the participants rated their overall quality of experience with virtual care as good or excellent. While 73 per cent of health care providers indicate that they can provide quality care to their patients using virtual care.

The information gathered will be one of many tools used to develop a long-term provincial strategy around virtual care. The province is also seeking input from health system partners and other affected

organizations on their experience using virtual care over the past two years.

Wild Pigs' Prolific Reproductive Capacity Fuels Expansion of Population and Range

A researcher with the University of Saskatchewan says the prolific reproductive capacity of wild pigs has fuelled a massive expansion of their range and numbers. Wild pigs destroy crops, reduce water quality, eat anything from an adult white tail deer to small mammals, birds and frogs and they can harbour disease and parasites.



Dr. Ryan Brook, an Associate Professor in the Department of Agriculture and Bioresources with the University of Saskatchewan, told those on hand earlier this month for Manitoba Pork's 2022 Annual General Meeting, when it comes to reproductive capacity, wild pigs are in a category of their own, typically producing six young per litter and multiple litters per year.

Dr. Ryan Brook-University of Saskatchewan:

Wild pigs currently occupy about one million square kilometers of Canada. The overwhelming majority of those are on the Canadian Prairie provinces of Alberta,

Saskatchewan and Manitoba and within each province there's one or two major hot spots. In Alberta it's west of Edmonton, there's a major stronghold and most of the pigs are there.

In Saskatchewan, a bit in the Battleford area but mainly near the Manitoba border in that Melfort, Saskatchewan country and there are more wild pigs in that area than the rest of Canada combined so, to be really clear, that is the hot spot in the country.

Take Precautions for Ticks Outdoors



To prevent tick bites:

Saskatchewan residents are being reminded to watch for ticks as they venture outdoors this spring.

Ticks are most often found in tall grass, brush, or wooded areas. They cannot jump or fly but will grasp onto people or pets who brush up against them.

- Wear light-coloured clothes so ticks can be easily seen.
- Wear pants, long-sleeved shirts, and shoes that do not expose your bare feet.
- Pull socks over your pant legs to prevent ticks from crawling up your legs.
- Use insect repellents that contain DEET or Icaridin. Apply repellent to clothes as well as your skin. Always read and follow the directions on the label. Some repellents may have age restrictions.
- In Canada, clothing that has been treated with the insecticide permethrin has been approved for use by people over the age of 16.
- Shower or bathe as soon as possible after being outside to wash off loose ticks and inspect for attached ticks.

If you find a tick attached to your skin or on your pet:

- Carefully remove it with fine-tipped tweezers and grasp the tick's mouthparts as close to the skin as possible.
- Pull slowly upward and out with firm, steady pressure.
- Be careful not to squeeze, crush or puncture the body after removal.
- Do not put Vaseline, gasoline, or other harmful substances on an attached tick.
- Submit photos of the tick using the eTick system, and please keep ticks in a secure container until you receive the identification results. Ticks can be euthanized by placing them in a bag and storing it in the freezer 24 hours.

Government of Saskatchewan Extends 4r Nutrient Stewardship Agreement with Fertilizer Canada

Saskatchewan accounts for nearly half (46 per cent) of all 4Rdesignated acres in western Canada.

The Government of Saskatchewan has re-signed a 2016 Memorandum of Co-operation (MOC) with Fertilizer Canada to support continued

education, training and expansion regarding 4R Nutrient Stewardship in the province for an additional three years.

Adoption of a fertilizer management strategy that incorporates the Right fertilizer source at the Right rate, at the Right time, and in the Right place (4Rs) enhances environmental sustainability for producer operations by reducing greenhouse gas emissions while increasing crop production. A made-in-Canada program, 4R Nutrient Stewardship promotes such environmental stewardship through best practices in science-based nutrient management.

The 4R Nutrient Stewardship Advisory Committee - established by the Ministry of Agriculture with Fertilizer Canada, industry stakeholders, and the scientific community - provides guidance on awareness and adoption of the 4R practices. Saskatchewan also encouraged adoption of 4R practices through 20 Agriculture Demonstration of Practices and Technologies (ADOPT) projects being carried out at Applied Research Management (Agri-ARM) field sites across the province, cofunded under the Canadian Agricultural Partnership (CAP) and with co-funding from Fertilizer Canada for select projects that are related to 4R. The ministry has also offered CAP funding under the Farm Stewardship Program for a variable rate mapping beneficial management practice, and held four virtual 4R workshops in January 2021.

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FCM: Launch of Funding for Inclusive Communities

On April 25, 2022, the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) announced that CanWILL launched its second round of applications for Inclusive Community Initiatives (ICI). This is an opportunity for 10 to 12 communities to receive up to \$10,000 each for initiatives that support women's participation in local leadership.

Activities must be implemented by local governments or an association in partnership with local community groups, between September 2022 and August 2023. The deadline to apply is June 10, 2022. Those interested can <u>consult the</u> <u>CanWILL webpage</u> to learn more and apply.

Local governments, in partnership with women's or community groups, from all regions of the country are invited to submit project ideas that support inclusive women's participation in local leadership. Note that FCM will prioritize initiatives intended to serve underrepresented women, including Indigenous, Black and other racialized women, as well as youth and members of the LGBTQ2S+ community. Small and rural communities are encouraged to apply. Priority will also be given to regions that were not supported in Round 1.

Assistance for Livestock Producers Impacted by Severe Spring Storms

The Provincial Disaster Assistance Program (PDAP) is available to support eligible livestock producers who have experienced significant financial losses due to recent extreme weather in Saskatchewan.

PDAP provides financial assistance to producers in eligible areas which have experienced substantial losses or damages to Compensation for livestock losses will be calculated using the rates under the Wildlife Damage Compensation and Livestock Predation Program administered by the Saskatchewan Crop Insurance Corporation.

Livestock losses have been reported in several rural municipalities in southeast Saskatchewan because of recent uninsurable property as a result of natural disasters, such as the recent record-breaking blizzards in southeast Saskatchewan. Local authorities, such as municipalities, must request designation through the PDAP office to initiate assistance for residents following an extreme weather event.

Producers whose local authorities have been designated as eligible for assistance can make claims for livestock loss, provided no coverage for losses is already available through existing insurance or other programs. spring storms that included periods of heavy snowfall, high winds and blizzard conditions. Livestock producers are encouraged to take photos/videos and document all livestock losses due to these extreme weather events.

More Highway Safety Improvements West of Prince Albert


Construction is underway on a \$21.4 million twinning project on Highway 3, west of Prince Albert.

The Highway 3 twinning project will cover almost eight kilometres and will run from the junction of Highway 2 to the Shell River bridge. The design includes a four-lane highway with a concrete median barrier in the centre of the road, four protected T-intersections, as well as new lighting throughout the corridor.

The Highway 3 safety improvements are in addition to new passing lanes which opened last

Government Supports Irrigation Expansion in Saskatchewan

The Ministry of Agriculture is providing additional support for irrigation development in the province with a \$2.5 million investment to help producers finance irrigation infrastructure.



The \$2.5 million included

in the 2022-23 Budget will allow producers to continue to access up to \$500,000 under the Irrigation Development Program, from the previous maximum payment of \$300,000. The Irrigation Development Program supports the installation of irrigation infrastructure, such as pumps and pipelines, to create a secure water supply to the edge of irrigable parcels of land.

The Government of Saskatchewan also recognizes that irrigators need additional time to complete projects within the current program timelines. In response to these challenges, the program deadline for Irrigation Development pre-approval applications has been extended from January 15, 2022, to December 31, 2022. The program deadline for Irrigation Environmental Efficiency pre-approval applications has been extended from August 1, 2022, to December 31, 2022. Extending the deadline will allow irrigators additional flexibility to complete their projects.

Applicants will have up to 18 months from written project approval to submit a claim under the program.

Notice to Municipalities: Fire Service Minimum Standard Guidelines

The Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency (SPSA) is excited to announce the launch of the Provincial Fire Service Minimum Standards Guide, which is now available at <u>saskpublicsafety.ca</u>. The Guide outlines a range of minimum standards

of minimum standards that fire departments can choose from to meet the needs of their residents. Comprehensive training guidelines ensure firefighters have the skills needed for safer and more efficient response. The guidelines also enhance coordination between elected officials and the fire department by providing an opportunity:

- For coordination and fiscal planning to ensure firefighters have the training and type of equipment they need for their service level; and
- To provide guidance on equipment maintenance.

All Fire Chiefs will be asked to review the Minimum Standards Guide and declare a service level based on those guidelines. This declaration of service would also determine the minimum associated training standards for your local fire department based on that service level, as well as the appropriate equipment required to meet your community's needs.

Please note that information regarding this launch has also been provided to Saskatchewan fire chiefs.

These **non-mandatory** guidelines could not have been developed without the strong collaborative efforts of the Saskatchewan Association of Fire Chiefs (SAFC), the Saskatchewan Volunteer Fire Fighters Association (SVFFA) and the Provincial Training Standards Committee. The Agency appreciates the high level of engagement and feedback these groups have provided over the past two years as these guidelines were developed.

Assessing and Declaring a Service Level

The assessment and declaration phase is now open and runs until October 31, 2023. During this time, fire departments should review the guidelines and declare a service level based on those guidelines. To assist Fire Chiefs during this phase, a set of questions and answers are also available on the <u>SPSA website</u>.

There are five steps involved in declaring a service level, which are listed below. Appendix A of the Fire Service Minimum Standards Guide provides more information on this process and outlines the action items associated with each of these steps.

Step 1: Fire Chief reviews the Minimum Standards Guide

Step 2: Fire Chief and council meet to discuss proposed service level

Step 3: Checklist is completed by the Fire Chief

Step 4: Fire Chief and council complete and approve the Declaration of Service Form

Step 5: The Declaration of Service Form is submitted to the SPSA

Once the declaration phase ends on **October 31, 2023**, the SPSA will provide council with a letter confirming the service level identified.

If you wish to participate in the program but require assistance with the process, we would be pleased to assist. Unless we hear from you, the SPSA's records will show that your community has decided not to participate in the program.

Health Renewal Funding Projects Benefit Patients

Patients, families, and health care staff across the province are benefitting from a \$100 million investment in health renewal projects. This is part of the government's \$7.5 billion, two-year capital plan to build a strong Saskatchewan and stimulate the province's economic recovery.

As of March 31, 2022, the Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA) has expended more than \$82 million in stimulus funding on completed

projects, including commitments to several projects currently underway or in the planning stages.

Over 400 projects have been completed to date with more than 120 others currently in progress or planning, including:

- an \$8 million investment in roof replacement and repairs to address potential future interior damage that could impact access to patient rooms at six facilities in Saskatoon, including Parkridge Centre, Royal University Hospital, St. Paul's Hospital, Social and Brief Detox, Kinsmen Children's Centre, and the Nurses Alumni Wing at Saskatoon City Hospital;
- boiler replacements at facilities across the North to improve the reliability and energy efficiency of heating equipment, and the installation of Oxygen concentrators to enhance nursing services and remove the risk of injury due to lifting and moving high-pressure tanks;
- changes to the aesthetic appearance of the Battleford Union Hospital's front entrance to enhance facility access with auto door openers and improve traffic flow and replacement of the aged Prince Albert Victoria Hospital elevator to ensure access to safe, reliable elevators for patients and staff

Provincial Public Safety Telecommunications Network: Radio Refresh Program Note that the monthly access fee, \$40.00 per radio, as well as the \$41.00 annual federal licence fee, will remain the responsibility of the user for all assigned radios.

This replacement program involves approximately 2,000 fire radios and will require technicians to travel to The Provincial Public Safety Telecommunications Network (PPSTN) began operation in 2010. At that time, radios were provided to firefighting agencies by the provincial government at that time at no charge beyond a monthly system access fee. Those radios are aging, and a four-year replacement program is now underway.

New radios will be supplied to all existing fire clients at no charge. This includes replacement of radios purchased by fire departments in excess of their initial allotment. hundreds of locations across Saskatchewan. Priority will be given to the larger, busier departments and smaller departments will be accommodated where practical. Clients will be contacted before SPSA technicians are scheduled to be in your area.



Building a Zero-Plastic Waste Strategy for Agriculture

cleanfarms

Throughout the 2020/2021 winter Cleanfarms commissioned grower research to better understand farmers' attitudes and behaviours around ag plastics recycling. The quantitative research primarily targeted growers in regions where pilots are operating (British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Ontario and the Maritime provinces). The information collected provides important baseline data that helped inform pilot development and will help assess pilot performance. Summaries, organized by region, are *available here*.

Some key findings across the regions are:

- When recycling programs are made available, farmers will overwhelmingly use them over other means.
- Overall, farmers are more satisfied when they can recycle an ag plastic versus other disposal methods like landfilling.
- Disposal habits generally reflect the availability and maturity of recycling programs in a region.
- There is a strong appetite amongst farmers to participate in pilots for recycling ag plastics.
- There is concern about potential costs associated with more permanent, long term recycling programs.

Pilots allow program operators to test out various aspects of program design such as storage techniques (e.g., collection bags or bins), collection scheduling (e.g., blitz style vs. collection days) and processing options.



The Ministry of Environment has a simple message for wellmeaning people who want to rescue what appear to be There can be hazards for humans, too. Wildlife can carry infectious diseases that can be transmitted to people, including orphaned young animals: please don't touch them.

Many animals leave their young alone for long periods while they forage for food, or to protect them from predators.

While "saving" the animal may seem like the right thing to do, contact with humans can significantly decrease a young animal's chances for survival.



rabies and West Nile virus. It's also illegal to take wild animals home. Only recognized wildlife rehabilitators are licensed to care for orphaned and injured animals, as they have the expertise to provide appropriate care.

A young animal should only be picked up if the parent is found dead nearby, or if the animal is found in an unnatural situation, such as a baby bird on a doorstep.

For instance, before concluding that a deer fawn is abandoned, ask yourself:

- Has it been lying in the same position for more than 10 hours?
- Is it vocal?
- Is it covered in insects?
- Is it wet, possibly covered by the morning dew?

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Saskatchewan Releases Latest Oil and Gas Emissions Report

[On May 18, 2022], the Ministry of Energy and Resources published its second Oil and Gas Emissions Management Regulations (OGEMR) Annual Emissions Report.

In 2021, greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions from vented and flared gas at upstream oil facilities in Saskatchewan totalled 4.4 million tonnes (Mt) of carbon dioxide equivalent (CO2e).

This represents a 6.5 Mt CO2e, or 60 per cent, reduction from 2015 levels and a 0.8 Mt or 15 per cent reduction from 2020 levels.

Multiple factors contributed to the provincial emissions reduction in 2021- primarily, the Saskatchewan oil and gas sector's investments in new equipment and/or infrastructure at key locations, which resulted in reducing company-level emissions.

Emission reductions outlined in Prairie Resilience: A Made-in-Saskatchewan Climate Change Strategy have been achieved and will likely be exceeded in 2025.

OGEMR is part of an equivalency agreement on methane emissions signed in 2020 with the federal government. The agreement established a five-year timeframe and expires on December 31, 2024.

Government of Saskatchewan Continues to Invest in Community Airports

The Government of Saskatchewan will invest \$935,000 through the Community Airport Partnership (CAP) program, supporting 11 airports. When combined with local matching dollars, this represents almost \$2 million investment in airport infrastructure.

CAP supports local airports helping to offset the costs of rehabilitation and improvements, with cost-shared grants up to a maximum of \$275,000. This year's investment will result in improvements to the following airports:

- Big River \$40,936 Runway edge light repairs, windsock pole, main runway and aprons rehabilitation
- Carlyle \$9,090 Crack fill runway and tarmac
- Estevan \$34,948 Crack sealing and line paining

- Kindersley \$46,614 Runway lighting upgrade
- La Ronge \$133,125 Airport drainage system maintenance
- Melfort \$256,715 Replace underground wiring and lighting around runway, taxiway and apron
- RM of Browning (RM 34) \$35,850 Add turn pads and pavement marking
- RM of Eldon (RM 471) \$18,582 Crack sealing for taxiway and apron
- RM of Moosomin (RM 121) \$256,715 Continued work on Phase 3 including new navigation system
- Weyburn \$97,500 Taxiway repairs, crack sealing and pavement marking
- Yorkton \$4,925 Information broadcast transmitter and friction index equipment

Get to Know Saskatchewan Safety Council

Since 1955, the Saskatchewan Safety Council has worked on countless injury prevention and safety initiatives covering a wide variety of issues, especially targeted towards those who are statistically at high risk, like children and youth, First Nations and rural populations, new Canadians, and seniors.



A community-based approach that starts with K-12, or before, will result in a shift of mindset. When young people learn about injury prevention because of their involvement in a sport or recreational activity and then have that backed up at school, by the time they get to their first job, hazard assessment and risk mitigation will come naturally. The potential of getting hurt will be more on their radar and being put in high-risk situations just won't be acceptable to them."

Today, injuries are known to cost the Saskatchewan economy approximately \$2.4 million dollars a day.

Regardless of where injuries take place, be that in our homes and yards while driving or taking part in recreational activities, or while at work, many result in chronic pain for which the sufferer potentially seeks out and develops an addiction to drugs or alcohol. That same pain may result in anxiety, depression, or other mental health disorders which, in the community, can lead to increases in crime, homelessness, unemployment, and violence.

"Our approach to injury prevention is to start young and get everyone in the community involved", says Robert Weitzel, Director of Development with the Council. "Our youth are our influencers and the future." of Education to strengthen the K-12 curriculum to enhance injury prevention information and safety resources in schools, to completely free online industryapproved workplace safety training, and the establishment of a network of community safety champions, the Council truly is engaged in injury prevention initiatives that are of benefit to everyone in Saskatchewan.

Funded through donations, membership contributions, sponsorships, grants, and the distribution of safety programs and materials, the revenues generated by the Safety Council are invested within the province of Saskatchewan to further promote safety.

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Changes to PST will Benefit Farmers and Agriculture Industry

Amendments to the Provincial Sales Tax (PST) regulations will provide greater clarity to farmers and help ensure that PST is applied fairly and consistently to farming and agricultural goods and services.

Effective April 1, 2022, new PST exemptions were made through regulation changes. These exemptions include:

- prefabricated wind breaker panels for use in the protection and handling of livestock
- insulators for electrified livestock fences
- certain farm equipment attached to a registered vehicle
- on-farm dugout excavation and for trenching (in specific circumstances related to farming)

Additionally, it was clarified that the following products are also exempt from PST and are retroactive to April 1, 2016:

- water storage tanks used in spraying or irrigating crops
- storage tanks for weed control chemicals, insecticides, fungicides, herbicides, liquid fertilizer
- adjuvants that improve their efficacy or application
- portable seed cleaners used on-farm by farmers in preparing their crop for storage or market (farmers in the business of seed cleaning must pay PST on their seed cleaning equipment)
- farm tractors





New and Interactive Fire Ban Map

The Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency is happy to announce that the new and interactive provincial Fire Ban Map is live at *saskpublicsafety.ca*.

This new map is more intuitive and visually appealing. It displays fire bans, restrictions and advisories from all authorities and provides improved quality and accuracy of fire ban information for the public. Users can zoom in and out freely, search for a specific location and access contact information. They can also select exactly what information they want to see on the map and view it on either a desktop or mobile device with ease.

To ensure a ban, advisory or restriction is displayed on the fire ban map, **the authorized administrator must call the Control Burn Line at 1-866-404-4911** to advise they have issued a fire ban. The Control Burn Line is answered 24/7, 365 days a year.



The caller will be asked to provide the following details:

- Their name
- Contact name
- RM, UM or fire department
- The location of the ban (e.g.: town, RM, park, etc.)
- The type of ban (ban/advisory/restriction).
 If it is a restriction or advisory details about what is included in the advisory or restriction, such as whether fire pits or agricultural burning are allowed, will be requested
- A phone number the public can call for more information

At the conclusion of the ban, advisory or restriction, it is important that the authorized administrator contact the SPSA so that the ban can be removed from the map.
